


RE-FRAMING

Changing the language we use changes how we see the world.

Really. It re-wires your brain.

Moral #1

Every word evokes a frame.

"Elephant"

Moral #2

Words defined within a frame evoke the frame.

"Larry picked up the peanut with his trunk."

Moral #3

Negating a frame evokes the frame.

"I am not a crook."

Moral #4

Evoking a frame reinforces that frame.

The neural circuitry of a frame is strengthened each time you activate it.

Bonus Moral #5

Sometimes, framing trumps the truth.

"Iraq has weapons of mass destruction."

Why should you care?

"Perl is not dead."

PLEASE STOP NEGATING THE FRAME

(Negating the frame evokes the frame, evoking the frame reinforces the frame.)
